If given the reason:

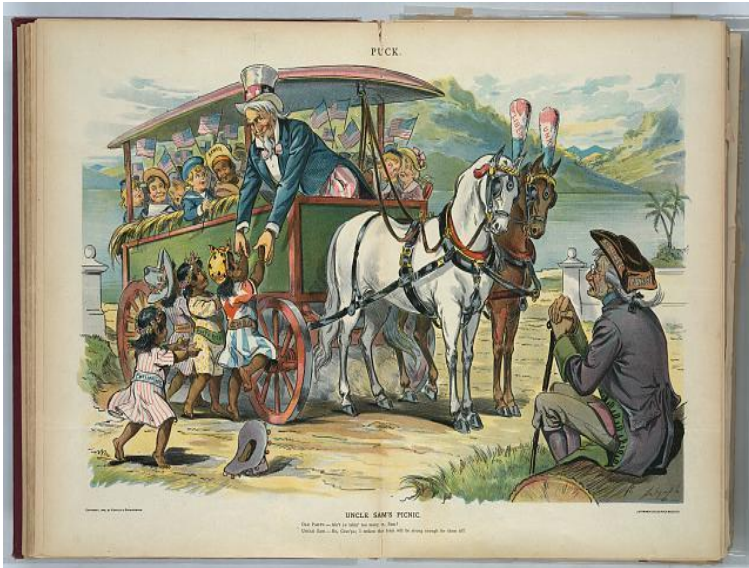
1) I circled the Japanese soldier because he dressed like a fisherman to hide his true intentions from America.
